National Translation Winner

The Richard Challoner School Community is delighted that one of its year 9 students, Finn Curtis, has recently been chosen as the Greater London winner of the National Translation Competition, run by Oxford University.

The competition work piece involved translating part of a book entitled Le Jardin du dedans-dehors (The Garden of the Inside-Outside) which tells the story of a young girl and her family who move to Iran in 1980 at the beginning of a war between Iraq and Iran. The girl and her brother enjoy exploring their new garden which seems sheltered from the upheaval taking place beyond the walls.

Commenting on his achievement, Finn said: "I was astonished to win! Learning French at Challoner is fantastic and I thoroughly enjoyed the translation competition."



The Translation Exchange launched a new competition for schools last Autumn which aims to promote language learning across the UK and to inspire creativity in the classroom. A team of Oxford MFL Undergraduates as well as professional translators from across the UK made up the judging panel.

The competition is inspired by the life and work of the great translator, Anthea Bell OBE who is ranked among the leading literary translators of the 20th and 21st centuries. Her work from German, French and Danish into English encompassed the writings of Freud, Hans Christian Andersen and many others.

St Fidelis Catholic Primary School in Erith couldn't be more proud of the 72 children from Key Stage 2 who graduated from Children's University in July 2021. 39 boys and 33 girls collected between 30 - 165 hours each for completing additional educational activities outside of the school day. We welcomed our parish priest back for our start of the school year Mass. Fr Stephen helped the children to reflect on the importance of the Mass, which was of great benefit to them.


Our prayer leaders attended Mass at St George's cathedral along with the Senior Leaders and Chair of Governors.

International Day of the Girl-Global Girl Gathering



On 11th October 2021 Form Captains in Year 10 and 11 at St Philomena's joined in solidarity with girls around the world to take part in the Global Girls Gathering. This year's theme as assigned by UNICEF, was 'Digital Generation, our Generation'. The aims of the day were to redefine the power of digital technology and how it can be used as a positive platform for empowerment and education.

Throughout the day there were two panel talks around the topics of the power of internet for girls. The panelist spoke about the importance of digital technology and how the digital era has increased the potential for girls to flourish in education, the workplace and society, if used appropriately. The panelists included; Tobi Oredein founder of Black Ballad (Black Ballad is a UK based lifestyle platform that seeks to tell the human experience through eyes of black British women), Josefa González Blanco Ortiz Mena- British Ambassador to the UK, Rozella Marie Mahjhrin- Body Diversity Activist, Nusrath Hassan - WOW Trustee and Girls' Education Activist (The WOW Foundation is a charity that believes a gender equal world is urgently required), Grace Davies Redmond - Senior Account Executive, John Doe PR, Nishma Robb - Director of Brand & Reputation Marketing at Google and Mary Ann Sieghart - Journalist. After each of the panels, students spoke in groups and submitted questions for them to answer.

This was a fantastic opportunity to demonstrate leadership skills and celebrate the International Day of the Girl with women from different countries- there were some students listening from Singapore and Malaysia. The day ended with a quiz- St Philomena's was placed sixth out of 170 different schools which gave a chance for celebration. We look forward to sharing what we have learnt in our form groups, spreading the knowledge further.

St James the Great Peckham: Pupils Excel in Chinese

Four years ago, St James the Great Catholic Primary School in Peckham made the bold decision to start teaching Mandarin Chinese to its primary pupils and are now reaping the rewards. Last Summer, 23 Year 6 pupils out of a class of 26 passed the internationally recognised 'Youth Chinese Test Level 1' and celebrated with a 5-course meal at local restaurant 'Mr Bao'.

The restaurant trip was sponsored by the Swire Chinese Language Foundation who support the learning of Mandarin in 127 schools across the UK. The owners of 'Mr Bao' treated the pupils to a private opening of the restaurant with a tailored tasting menu just for them! Some of the highlights for the children



were the chance to test their chopstick skills and to taste dumplings, 'bao' buns and lychee juice. "We felt just like royalty", one pupil wrote in his review of the day.

Haniel, whilst in Year 6, entered a translation of a Mandarin poem for the Stephen Spender Prize which celebrates multilingualism and literary translation.

Haniel was 'commended' in the 14 and under category for his Chinese to English poetry. A great achievement.

As part of Haniel's commentary on his translation he stated "I added a light and dark theme to showcase the contradiction of life, how people could be living at peace while others may be in a nightmare". Haniel continues his studies at St Thomas the Apostle College, Nunhead.
