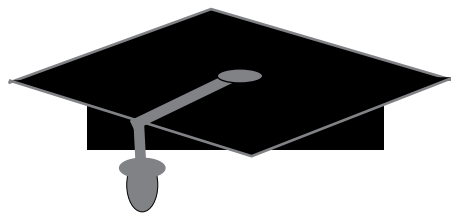

## Laleham Lea School Pupils Support Samaritans' Purse



Pupils from Laleham Lea School in Purley have lovingly filled over 60 shoe boxes with gifts and treats for those in need around the world this Christmas.

The boxes have been donated to Operation Christmas Child, a project run by international Christian relief organisation the Samaritan's Purse.

Since 1990, more than 178 million children in more than 150 countries have received an Operation Christmas Child shoebox. For many of these children, the gift-filled shoebox is the first gift they have ever received.

They have now successfully completed all elements and achieved their Gold awards.

easy as we do, and thus, we also show understanding that we know what they might feel like.

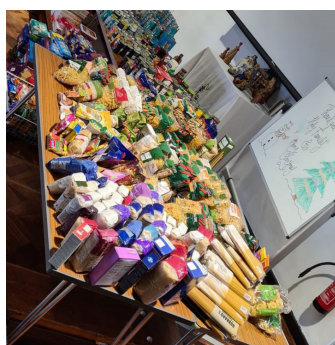
Affection was shown from the moment we all decided to come together and give because at the end of the day, giving is one of the biggest acts of affection and love there can be.

Amongst the donations, we received over 40 boxes of mince pies, 67 tins of baked beans, 78 packs of pasta and almost 50 tins of soup. 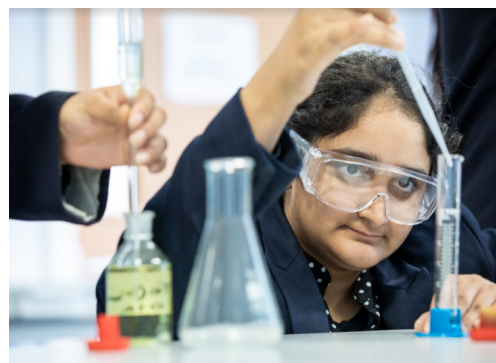

## St Philomena Students Compete in the Chemistry Olympiad 2021

The Chemistry Olympiad is designed to challenge and inspire students in secondary education. This enriching experience is a unique opportunity for St Philomena's A-Level Chemistry students to push themselves further and excel in the field of chemistry.

The chemists at St Philomena's developed critical problem-solving skills, learn to think more creatively and get a chance to test their knowledge in new, real-world situations. They could even find themselves representing the UK at the prestigious International Chemistry Olympiad.

On Friday 22nd January 2021, seven pupils from St Philomena's sat the two hour online written exam of Chemistry Olympiad 2021 Round one.



The students involved are Thinara Kumarasinghe, Siruja Srimohan, Rania Ocho, Jolene D'souza, Annmary Kuriakose, Abigail Laryea and Trivina Tadrous.

Up to 30 of the highest-scoring students from round one will take part in lessons and demonstrations on new topics from respected academics, teachers and technicians, followed by a theoretical test.

In March round two will be held online. Four students from round two will be chosen to represent the United Kingdom at the International Chemistry Olympiad.

The 2021 International Chemistry Olympiad will be hosted by Japan from 24 July – 2 August 2021.

# Happy 60th Birthday to Bishop Thomas Grant School!

## Here is a brief background on your favourite school on its 60th birthday

The school is named after the first Bishop of Southwark, Thomas Grant (1816-1870) who was named in the First Vatican Council. The school was opened on 9 September 1959 as a voluntary aided, co-educational 11-18 Catholic comprehensive school, the first of its kind in the South of England. It was the vision of Canon Crowley, the Parish Priest of English Martyrs Church in Streatham. He passionately encouraged his parishioners to donate all they could to help build the school in the 1950's. The school site was originally a farm and the land was donated by the Diocese of Southwark to build the school. It finally opened in 1959 and was dedicated to Christ the King. The school badge reflects Bishop Thomas Grant's coat of arms. The crown represents Christ as a King and the alpha / omega represents the endurance of Christ along with its motto "Instaurare Omnia In Christo, To unite all things in Christ".

Mr James Rudden was the first Headteacher.

The school's large illuminated cross was proudly lit at night and can still be seen in its prominent position on a hill above Streatham Common.



## A few memories from two of the school's original students

Where have all the years gone? We new pupils, felt very fortunate as it was the first Catholic Comp. in London and everything was brand new and "modern". It was as if all the students had a clean slate. No teachers knew of us or our siblings and they were new and untested to us. Julie and I were even more fortunate as we had visited BTG earlier dressed in our new uniform (complete with straw boater hat). The Head of St. Andrew's knew Mr. Rudden well so suggested we modelled the uniform for him and - I think - the Deputy Head. The school looked enormous to us after our primary school, but everybody was "in the same boat" and not at all intimidated.

Everything seemed to be so big and new. The school was so large and I feared I would never get to know my way around and getting lost and being late for my next class. I remember being in the Hall along with everyone else and very nervously waiting to hear my name called out and the Form I was assigned to. Bit like Harry Potter and the kids waiting to see which house they were going to. It was terrifying! And my uniform was who knows how many sizes too big so that I "would grow into it!" What a laugh when one thinks back on it.

## Christmas Charity at Bishop Thomas Grant School

Christmas at Bishop Thomas Grant School is normally the busiest time of the year for fundraising, with the Christmas Fair and Carol Concert.
