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THE HOST APOSTOLATE

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There is a well-used hymn often sung at children's celebrations starting with the words: 'Give me Joy in my heart keep me praising, give me Joy in my heart I pray, give me Joy in my heart keep me praising, keep me praising till the end of day'. We are now, in the northern hemisphere, in summertime, a time when there is a focus on outdoor activities and holidays. As ever there are 'end of term' school celebrations, and the usual activities of everyday life that many would classify as joyful: Celebrations that often reveal some form of happiness. There are marriage anniversaries, those of years of service, ordinations and anniversaries of the success same. There are in employment, achievements and chapters well concluded. Many of these events do bring much happiness but is that really the same as Joy..?

Like so many words 'Joy' can convey many feelings and expressions of some form of satisfaction, but is that really what Christian Joy is all about? St. Paul writing to the Galatians (6:22) says that the Spirit produces Joy... it is in fact a gift of the Holy Spirit, a fruit of His action.

Happiness often depends on something occurring that makes a change for us, an event or something achieved, something alters and makes life easier for us or more successful, feeling better etc. In other words it is 'event' centred. Now sometimes joy can result and lead from this happiness... but is it the same thing?


Many people would consider that Joy cannot coexist with sadness and events that bring sorrow. But Joy is so profoundly different to happiness. Joy, of itself, reminds us of what is essential in our relationship with God and that we can always be joyful even when things do not go as they should and we would hope they would.. But Joy centres on our relationship with God and the belief that all things will be well and that we are destined for a life that goes beyond

mere satisfaction in the things that make us happy, but centres on the profound Truth that we are children of Hope, and that we are made for another life centred on God. This kind of Joy shines forth amidst any kind of darkness and gives us the liberty of the children of God. It is based on the fact that with all our faults and failings, disappointment and pain, sorrows and losses, we are loved and created for love. It is a joy that speaks of an encounter, a meeting with the author of all life and all that is blessed among us. E. Stanley Jones put it beautifully when he said 'when I met Christ I thought that I had swallowed sunshine.' We could all do with swallowing that sunshine especially in the times that we live in.

Although writing in summer the same clearly is true in any season. When we are doing things that we

Fr, David May wrote recently of how he enjoyed, as many of us do, walking along the sea shore observing the waves and the vastness of the ocean. I quote: "But these waves also carry another message there is Someone with us, as vast and vaster than any ocean and seas and great skies- Someone filled with mystery. Paradoxically there is a kind of Silence at the sea shore, despite the pounding of the waves that is deep and sustaining and greater than the waves, even of terrible storms. That silence is that of Someone who has the whole of the universe on His fingertips held in being so gently, even tenderly. Waves and wind, sky and earth sun and moon, all bless His name and sing of it in their own way. Perhaps we humans are slowest to learn that song but

we would do well on summer days to return to their school and touch again the deep Mystery of Presence that is hidden yet visible, if we have eyes to see and ears to hear. That name of course is Jesus. (From 'Restoration' Fr. David May. Madonna House, Combermere, Canada)

Many years ago I visited a priest who had returned from much time in a mission station. Now elderly, but also suffering from many Cancers he was full of Joy. I asked him how he dealt with all the pain....He replied smiling the broadest smile, "...well, when I walk, when I can, I spell out the name Jesus and every step fills me with Joy". He had indeed discovered the mystery of Presence.

Joy and Thanksgiving go hand in hand. Learning to praise, in other words telling Jesus how wonderful both He is and everything that He has given us in whatever form it takes, is one of the secrets of a joy filled spirit. Prayer, sincere prayer, is the very start of that inward journey leading to Joy.

Franz Joseph Haydn, the composer, said: 'When I think upon God, my heart is so full of Joy that the notes dance and leap from my pen; and since God has given me a cheerful heart, it will be pardoned me that I serve with a cheerful spirit.'

We are often dismayed when we see people who have lost everything say 'thank God' that... this or that... usually that they are still alive. That is Holy Joy.

In these sometime dark times when all seems to have been lost or denied we would do well to seek Joy.. it can become a 'good friend' and the Lord is never restricted in the amount that he can grant us.



In August we also have the great feast to the Assumption of The Blessed Virgin Mary. What joy must have filled her heart all the way thought her life even with all the sorrows, and what Joy must have been hers when reunited with her Son. Her Joy, that

special Joy, given to the pure in heart certainly sustained the Apostles.

Maybe as we go through the summer months, we can pray for more of that special Joy that dispels the
