"Education in environmental responsibility can encourage ways of acting which directly and significantly affect the world around us, such as avoiding the use of plastic and paper, reducing water consumption, separating refuse, cooking only what can reasonably be consumed, showing care for other living beings, using public transport or car-pooling, planting trees, turning off unnecessary lights, or any number of other practices". LS 211

8 – To commit a crime against the natural world is a sin against ourselves and a sin against God.

23 - "Humanity is called to recognize the need for changes of lifestyle, production and consumption, in order to combat this warming or at least the human causes which produce or aggravate it."

25 - Climate change is a global problem with grave implications: environmental, social, economic, political and for the distribution of goods. It represents one of the principal challenges facing humanity in our day. Its worst impact will probably be felt by developing countries in coming decades."

33 - It is not enough, however, to think of different species merely as potential "resources" to be exploited, while overlooking the fact that they have value in themselves. Each year sees the disappearance of thousands of plant and animal species which we will never know, which our children will never see, because they have been lost for ever. The great majority become extinct for reasons related to human activity. Because of us, thousands of species will no longer give glory to God by their very existence, nor convey their message to us. We have no such right.

35 – In assessing the environmental impact of any project...few careful studies are made of its impact on biodiversity as if the loss of species or animals and plant groups were of little importance.

43 – We were not meant to be inundated by cement, asphalt, glass and metal, and deprived of physical contact with nature

59 – As often occurs in periods of deep crisis which require bold decisions, we are tempted to think that what is happening is not entirely clear. Such evasiveness serves as a licence to carrying on with our present lifestyles and models of production and consumption.

87 – When we can see God reflected in all that exists, are hearts are moved to praise the Lord for all his creatures and to worship him in union with them.

92 - Peace, justice and the preservation of creation are three absolutely interconnected themes.

92 – Every act of cruelty towards any creature is 'contrary to human dignity'

92- Everything is related, and we human beings are united as brothers and sisters on a wonderful pilgrimage, woven together by the love God has for each of his creatures and which also unites us in fond affection with brother sun, sister moon, brother river and mother earth.

139 – We are part of nature, included in it...
